
## Hope Peperomia





This plant filters pollutants from the air while releasing oxygen. With this plant in your home, you breathe cleaner air.



This plant is considered non-toxic, therefore safe around children and pets.

## Peperomia (deppeana×quadrifolia) tetraphylla 'Hope'

- <u>Use:</u> Peperomias are some of the most popular houseplants due to their ease of care. The genus Peperomia species encompasses over 1,000 varieties that would nicely complement any home décor. Originally from tropical regions of Central and South America, peperomia plants have eye-catching leaves and a tolerance for a wide range of conditions. Native to Southern Florida and the Caribbean
- Exposure/Soil: Morning sun to light shade outdoors (when nites are above 60 degrees); bright indirect light indoors. Water when top inch of soil is dry to the touch and sparingly in winter. Moist, well-drained soil. No fertilizer is needed the first few months after planting, then feed at monthly intervals with a water-soluble house plant fertilizer. Day and night temperatures of 60-75°F are fine year round.
- **Growth:** Grows 8-12" tall and continues to trail.
- Hardiness: Zone 10-12, Annual, Houseplant;
- <u>Foliage</u>: Thick erect stems of waxy, elliptic, thick dark green leaves (to 6" long).
- **Flower:** Flowers are long, brown and green, spindly spikes protruding from the plant. While they are underwhelming in appearance, this is a positive sign the plant is happy and thriving. Some growers remove the flowers in order to redirect the plant's energy to producing more foliage.
