## Baptisia 'Purple Smoke'

- <u>Use:</u> Features smoky violet, lupine-like flowers (from B. australis) and gray-green, clover-like foliage on charcoal stems (from B. alba). Blue Wild Indigo has a deep taproot which permits it to withstand dry conditions and heat. It makes a nice backdrop in the perennial garden.
- <u>Exposure/Soil</u>: Prefers full–part sun. It's fairly drought tolerant and needs little water once established.
- *Growth:* Grows 3-4 tall and wide. Plants may be increased by dividing in spring, every 4 to 5 years, or by moving any seedlings that may appear, while they are still small. May need staking.
  - • <u>Hardiness</u>: Zone 4-9; Perennial.
  - **Foliage:** Deciduous. Attractive, blue-green, lobed foliage remains effective throughout the growing season.
  - <u>Flower:</u> Purple flowers appear in mid-spring, opening up from bottom to top in erect but slightly arching terminal racemes (to 1' long) which extend well above the foliage. Flowers give way to cylindrical, bean-like seed pods (to 2.5" long) which have good ornamental interest and are sometimes used in dried flower arrangements.
