Camellia japonica 'R.L.Wheeler'

- <u>Use:</u> Camellias are the rose of winter in southern gardens, with their colorful blossoms held against deep rich green glossy foliage on a naturally upright to rounded evergreen shrub. Pick the flowers and float them in a bowl of water to bring their beauty indoors.
- <u>Exposure</u>: Prefers sheltered site, sunny or shade, and any <u>well</u>
 <u>drained</u> neutral/acid soil. Extreme summer heat may cause leaf burn;
 needs some shade if planted near a white house due to reflection of
 sun.
- **Growth:** Low growing to 8ft-12. tall and wide, 8-10' wide and larger with age.
- *Hardiness:* 6-9; shrub
- Foliage: Evergreen, glossy.
- <u>Flower</u>: Large, rose-pink, semi-double to anemone, up to 5 inches across. Outer petals, of heavy texture, are twisted and folded. Inner petals, semi-erect, framing a mass of stamens which fan out in a solid circle. Filaments and anthers yellow. <u>Prune only right after blooms fade.</u>
