## Nova Zembla Rhododenron

and azaleas, Nova Zembla is a
power player in bright red. Informally known as one of the
"Iron-clad" rhododendrons,
Nova Zembla is easy to grow
and more heat tolerant than
other rhododendrons,

## Rhododendron x 'Nova Zembla' (H-1)

- <u>Use:</u> A small, dense, upright, evergreen shrub prized for its large trusses of showy, bright red flowers. A cold hardy rhododendron that thrives in cooler regions but benefits from protection from winter winds. Flower color develops a deep pink tone in sunnier exposures. Very useful in foundation plantings or as a landscape accent.
- Exposure/Soil: Part sun to shade. As with other azaleas, the partial shade of tall trees overhead is the ideal. It will adapt to full-sun sites, though. You just need to water it during times when it isn't raining enough. Grows best in moist, well-drained, organic soils with a pH range from 4.5 to 6.0. "Well-drained" is the key. Planting it in places that don't drain well is a sure death sentence.
- **Growth**: Moderate growing; reaches 5 ft. tall and wide.
- Hardiness: Zones 4-8; Shrub
- <u>Foliage</u>: Evergreen. Leaves are lance shaped, medium sized and light green.
- <u>Flower:</u> Showy red flowers with deep maroon blotches attract hummingbirds and butterflies. These trumpet-shaped flowers open each spring beginning in April.
