- <u>Use:</u> They earn their strong warrior title, 'Cherokee Brave' because they
 are tough and low maintenance. They are pest and disease resistant, while also
 being drought tolerant. Simply plant your new Cherokee Brave Dogwoods and
 watch them thrive.
- Exposure/Soil: Part sun-shade. Best when planted under other trees, but not too deep a shade or poor flowering. Moist, well-drained soil, but not soggy. Use slow release fertilizer two times a year. Water regularly, when top 3 in. of soil is dry.
- <u>Growth</u>: Reach heights of 20 to 30 feet, so they can fit perfectly in any landscape. Even those with limited space. They will flourish with unrivaled beauty without taking over the yard.
- Hardiness: Zone 5-9; Tree
- <u>Foliage</u>: Deciduous. Leaves first emerge they have a red tint before maturing to lush, green leaves that fill in to create an attractive canopy that shades the area beneath it. In the fall the leaves turn a shade of maroon for a dazzling display of colorful fall foliage.
- <u>Flower</u>: Your friends and neighbors will love gazing at the Cherokee Brave Dogwood's large four petal blossoms that have a unique red hue that fades into a white center. The flowers glow in the landscape and will cause your garden to be the most beautiful one in the neighborhood.
